

Do cables routed through cable trays need to be run through conduits

Indoor, low-risk environments: In typical industrial or commercial settings where the tray is not exposed to heavy mechanical stress, conduit is optional.

When Conduit Is Recommended or Required High-risk areas: Locations with forklifts, vehicles, heavy equipment, or high foot traffic may require conduit to protect cables from impact, crushing, or abrasion.

Outdoor or underground installations: Conduit provides protection against UV exposure, extreme weather, and moisture. Standard tray cables must be in conduit when placed underground unless specifically rated for direct burial.

Hazardous or classified locations: Chemical plants, explosive atmospheres, or damp environments often mandate conduit for safety.

Local code or AHJ requirements: Authorities having jurisdiction may require conduit even if national standards do not.
