

Do ordinary optical cables have markings

- 5. Manufacturer and Part Number:** The cable jacket typically shows the manufacturer's name and part number for traceability and inventory purposes.
- 6. Additional Specifications:** Other markings may include: Cable diameter and weight (e.g., 0.89IN, 206 LB/KFT) Minimum bend radius (e.g., MBD 27IN) Maximum pulling tension (e.g., 600LBF) Distance markings along the cable for installation tracking.
- 7. Model Codes:** Some cables use model codes to indicate construction and features. For example, "GYGZL03" can be decoded as GY (outdoor optical cable), G (metal heavy reinforcing member), Z (self-supporting structure), L (aluminum sheath), 03 (polyethylene sleeve without armor).
- 8. Temperature Rating:** Certain cables include a code for the applicable temperature range, e.g., A (−40°C to +40°C), B (−30°C to +50°C), C (−20°C to +60°C), D (−5°C to +60°C).
