

How to reconnect the fiber optic cable after cutting it

Step 5: Protect the Splice After splicing, cover the joint with a protective sleeve or connector housing to prevent physical damage and environmental exposure.

Step 6: Test the Connection Use an OTDR or light source and power meter to verify the splice quality and ensure minimal signal loss. Confirm that the network or optical system is functioning correctly.
