- Apply 130C Tape:** Start wrapping at least 2.5 cm (1 inch) away from the damaged area, overlapping half the tape width, and continue until 2.5 cm past the damage.
- Apply Vinyl Tape:** Wrap a layer of vinyl electrical tape over the 130C tape, starting from the opposite end, maintaining a flat lay and half-width overlap.

Type B: Severe Damage (Core or Armor Exposed)

- Prepare the Cable:** Cut away damaged sheath and exposed armor carefully.
- Clean and Scuff:** As with Type A, clean and scuff the surrounding area.
- Reinforce the Core:** If the fiber core is exposed, use a protective sleeve or heat-shrink tubing before wrapping.
- Wrap with Repair Tape:** Apply 130C tape and vinyl tape as described for Type A, ensuring full coverage of the exposed section.
