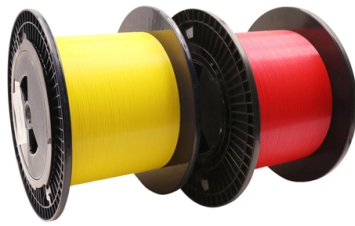


What precautions should be taken when splicing optical cables
